### Instructions

Complete the worksheet by selecting a national performance measure from the Public Health Performance Measure Instructions.

<b>Problem Statement</b> (brief 1-2 sentence statement of the specific unmet need, problem, or issue in the community that your AmeriCorps program will address)
<b>Intervention</b> (small paragraph describing type of intervention, design, and dosage of intervention – intensity, frequency, and duration)
<b>OUTPUT</b>
<b>National Performance Measure Number/Title</b>
<b>Target</b> (the number you expect to reach – do not use percentages)
<b>Measured By</b> (unit of measure or population, i.e. children, miles, etc.)
<b>Instrument</b> (enter data collection tool and method, define the minimum dosage necessary to be counted as successful)
<b>OUTCOME</b>

## Checklist

This checklist can be used to assess your performance measures but does not need to be submitted.

Checklist Item	Yes	No
<b>Performance Measure Requirement</b>		
There is at least one aligned performance measure (output + outcome) corresponding to the primary intervention.		
All performance measures reflect significant program activities whose outputs and outcomes are consistent with the applicant's program design.		
<b>Output Quality</b>		
Outputs clearly specify what is counted.		
Outputs count only program beneficiaries, not AmeriCorps members.		
<b>Outcome Alignment</b>		
Outcomes are logically aligned with the outputs.		
Outcomes reflect a meaningful change in knowledge, attitude, behavior or condition for program beneficiaries.		
Outcomes can be measured during a single grant year.		
<b>Targets</b>		
Output and outcome targets are reasonable for the proposed program design.		
Targets are expressed as numbers, not percentages.		
<b>Data Collection/Instruments</b>		
Data collection methods are appropriate for the output/outcome being measured.
